Over the summer, Joe's Place lost one of its long-time supporters, Carole Anne Gault (nee Clement). (June 10, 1935 - June 11, 2020)

Carole grew up in Maplewood and was an MRH graduate of 1953. According to her daughter, Elizabeth Lowis, Carol's favorite teacher was her English teacher and personal mentor, Mrs Helen Hamin. After graduating high school, she married Harold Fred Gault (MRH class of '52) in 1956. Mrs. Hamlin was at the wedding. Carol began working in a gift shop and taught herself how to create floral arrangements. In 1986, she went into business for herself and opened Hathaway's Gift and Floral shop in Crestwood Plaza followed by additional locations. Her next career was travelling as a silk floral and gift sales representative. She would drive her mobile showroom, a converted trailer home, along the back roads and blue highways of the Midwest.

Carole loved Joe's Place because her parents were unable to care for her during WWII. So, she was raised by her Aunt and Uncle Blatti on Rannells Avenue in Maplewood. She was forever thankful she had a safety net of family. That's why years later, she believed Joe's Place was a charity she could support through her monthly MRH class of 1953 Lunch Bunch. Each month Carole and classmates would donate to Joe's Place. Carole was able to enjoy her Lunch Bunch up until 2 years ago, when her Parkinson's began to hold her back from social activities.

Described as a lover of all things beautiful, Carol would often tell her children to deal with the hard times with jokes and laughter. Carole loved golf, art, and watching NCIS with her family. She was also an avid volunteer throughout her life for many organizations. Carol's last act of kindness was requesting that memorials be sent to Joe's Place in her name. Her spirit for supporting children, nonprofits, and the Black Lives Matter movement will be greatly missed. Carole was a Mom of 3, Grandmother of 3, and Great Grandmother to one. LETTER FROM BOARD PRESIDENT

On a personal level I realized early in the pandemic that making a conscious effort to take notice of daily experiences that create the feeling of being grateful, and appreciating even the smallest of those gestures, would be important. For example, I no longer overlook a kind word or text, a beautiful sunset, a hug from someone in my household, or even a snuggle from our cat. This act of being present helps me find connection and joy.

I am humbled to be a member of the caring community of Joe's Place. It has been a privilege witnessing the love and commitment of our house parents who continue to give so unselfishly; the generosity of a community that opened their hearts and rallied behind our two MRH 2020 graduates; the dedication of MRH District and high school staff that go above and beyond each and every day; the pledge from foundations, funders, and community members to serve the vulnerable members of our community;



the flexibility and enthusiasm from our new part-time case manager to successfully launch the new Joe's Place graduate program during a difficult year; the energy and commitment of current and previous board members and volunteers who work to ensure stability in the lives of young men; the creativity and generosity given by our part-time administrative and development staff; the perseverance of current Joe's Place residents and alumni even when facing extreme adversity.

The foresight of the Joe's Place Board and staff to formally expand service delivery in 2019 also fills me with gratitude. Considering the pandemic, formalizing supports for our alumni was implemented at the right time. Joe's Place now offers three programs for its residents and graduates that are overseen by the Board of Directors, a Program Committee, house parents, and a part-time case manager.

Resident

Every school year up to four male students live at the house under the supervision and guidance of two house parents. The residents are given a loving home, regular meals, tutoring, professional counseling, transportation, summer enrichment opportunities, and a support system with an emphasis on high school graduation, college, and career readiness.

Senior

This program focuses on seniors within our resident program. Participants receive intensified preparation for post secondary education and career readiness. They also receive additional mentorship, application assistance, and counseling to prepare them for college, trade school, or military enrollment.

Graduate

The graduate program is supported by a case manager who works with our alumni who find themselves experiencing housing insecurities during periods of transition such as college breaks, post-secondary graduation, and job changes. Participants receive assistance with college and career choices, housing, and mental health needs. This supplementary layer of support ensures our graduates will experience the stability necessary to focus on a healthy, independent, and rewarding future.

After installing the new executive leadership, long-time MRH volunteer, Heath Moylan, stepped down as Board President and was presented with a gift for his years of service from the board. Heath joined the board in 2014 and served in various roles, including board president from 2016 - 2019. Under Heath's leadership, the board implemented a senior and graduate program, hired two staff positions to grow the organization, spearheaded a three-year strategic plan, and oversaw The Maplewood Shuffle for many years. We are truly indebted to his guidance and dedication. We are also very grateful to his wife and Richmond Heights Councilwoman, Megan Moylan, for Heath's time away from his family and for her countless hours of volunteering behind the scenes.

A few months later in the summer, Dan Keating retired from the board. Dan had served on the board since 2014. As a professor at Washington University School of Law, his knowledge and experience were significant assets to our team. We owe Dan a debt of gratitude for his willingness to serve and counsel, as well as his dedication to the mission of Joe's Place. We look forward to keeping in touch with Dan and seeing him and his wife, Jane Keating, at future Joe's Place events.

Joe's Place also shifted our board liaisons with the MRH School Board. This year Brandi Herndon-Miller and Ralphy Posley exchanged places with long-time board volunteers Maria Langston (since 2009) and Francis Chmelir (since 2016). We are thankful to Maria and Francis and to the MRH School Board for their ongoing partnership, guidance, support, and humble service.

Most recently, we welcomed new board members Stacey Kelley, a Digital Portfolio Management employee at Ameren, and Pastor Josiah Green. Both members will carry on the tradition of serving on our board as charter member liaisons for Crossroads Presbyterian Church. We are thankful for their willingness to serve.

REFLECTIONS FROM CASE MANAGER RACHEL MAPP

At not quite the one-year mark with the new Joe's Place post-graduate program, we are working to position the organization as one that continues providing meaningful support and a sense of belonging to alumni long after high school graduation. The goals for the first year were to reconnect with alumni and create a plan to stay in regular contact, assess needs, and create a plan to provide appropriate support. To date we have connected with all the alumni and are cultivating a relationship with each young man. We also created and implemented a voluntary quarterly check-in survey to gauge alumni's success, needs, stress level, and barriers, which is providing important data.

Another ongoing goal for the graduate program is identifying other organizations or targeted resources that can support alumni in their current communities. One great example of this is an alumnus for whom Joe's Place quickly became a regular support system through direct assistance and facilitated connections with other organizations for food resources, utility assistance, goal setting, career planning, resume critique, mental health check-ins, and regular personal encouragement. After nearly 10 months this young man has finished a certification program, found gainful employment in his field, and has reported an improved mental health standing. In fact, he has volunteered his time and energy to give back to Joe's Place in the last few months and requested to repay the monetary support Joe's Place gave to him in his time of need.

Other examples of the support provided to Joe's Place alumni through the new graduate program and expanded community support include:

- furniture for independent living
- job/interview coaching
- clothing assistance for interviews
- parenting resources
- FASFA assistance
- housing search
- transportation to medical appointments
- resources to obtain higher or technical education
- scholarship application assistance
- college search and application process with high school seniors
- post graduation housing plans with high school seniors
- socially distanced graduation celebration for high school seniors

The focus for next year will be to continue the goals of this year and build out a more robust support system and resource network. Beginning this fall we are piloting a mentorship program. We hope to build this opportunity for all alumni who feel they might benefit from a mentor / mentee relationship with professionals in our community for networking, advice, problem solving, general support and encouragement. "What is one special dinner request?" Joe's Place house parents Amber Compton and Matt Bauersachs ask each young man moving into the home this simple but meaningful question.

Do you remember your special meal from your childhood? That very favorite dish for a birthday celebration or as recognition for a job well done? Perhaps you even learned how to prepare it to share with your own family (or taught your partner how to make it for you!).

Amber and Matt recently explained that the simple question serves multiple purposes. In addition to providing that meaningful meal for the household to share while celebrating one of their own, it also provides each young man a quick successful experience in using their voice in an assertive manner, a valuable lesson they try to build upon every opportunity possible. They also find that it sparks an interest in learning about cooking and kitchen navigation, important for life skill development.



Self-proclaimed foodies, Amber and Matt believe in sharing their love of good food with the young men who call Joe's Place home. Their kitchen is the epicenter of the home. Amber takes the lead on the gourmet dinner prep and baking, while Matt is the grill master, short-order breakfast cook, and creative leftover guru. Both take great joy in sharing their culinary skills, helping the young men explore their palates, and making cooking and eating together fun and meaningful. Their belief in the power of meals to foster a sense of community could not be timelier, particularly considering the pandemic and serving as house parents through the shelter in place order last spring.

One Joe's Place resident says, "I LOVE Amber's shrimp & grits!", a sentiment shared by Matt and apparently one of the household's favorite special meals. This resident went on to say, "I am also learning how to prepare my own meals and trying foods I have never had before."
